Your speaker this morning has served as chairman of the State Bar Committee on Administration of Justice. He has served as chairman of the Judicial Section of the Texas Bar Association. At present, he is serving

as the Supreme Court member of the Texas Civil Judicial Council.

Your speaker this morning is not only a distinguished jurist, but a legal and historical scholar and has published many articles in legal and historical learned journals—which time doesnot permit me to enumerate.
