Commercial Law-Law 610

COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVE

DESCRIPTION:

This course is a 4-credit course covering Negotiable Instruments and Secured Transactions. We will address the principles and practices of the Uniform Commercial Code focusing on Articles 3, 4 and 9 that are those areas primarily covered on the Texas Bar Exam. The Course Methodology is designed to address the Learning Outcomes stated below using the Evaluation Tools outlined.

OBJECTIVE:

The goal for this course is to teach students to read and comprehend relevant statutory language found in UCC Articles 3, 4, and 9 (including the code provisions and the corresponding explanatory materials (Official Comments). Additionally, students will successfully reflect their understanding of the language by, first, identifying relevant legal issues raised in Texas Bar-type fact scenarios and, secondly, providing comprehensive analysis of those issues.

Extra Credit POP Quizzes and RETAKES:

20 minutes short essay questions

Students will be given several opportunities to practice short essay written analysis that demonstrates understanding of commercial law concepts. Extra credit points will be awarded based on the following:

(1) <u>In-Class POP Quizzes:</u> Students will take 5 extra credit POP quizzes during class time. The goal for the POP essay quizzes is to give students even more practice writing and analyzing one or two issues through application of *facts* and *black letter law concepts from relevant code sections*. Students will potentially earn a maximum of 3 points for each POP essay quiz.

(2) **RETAKE** <u>In-Class POP Quizzes:</u> Students will **RETAKE** the in-class pop quizzes during tutorial class time on the following week after it is offered. The goal for the **RETAKE** opportunity is to give students yet another exercise in writing and analyzing one or two issues after they have received written comments. Students will participate in "quiz viewings" before the **RETAKE** opportunity during tutorial.

*******The highest score after the retake will be recorded as the final quiz grade.* Pop quizzes will be added as extra credit points to your total score at the end of the semester

<u>Policy for MISSED In-Class</u> <u>POP QUIZZES</u>: THERE WILL BE <u>NO MAKE-UP</u> <u>POP</u> <u>QUIZZES</u> if you fail to attend class on a "pop quiz" day. If you miss an in-class quiz, you will <u>NOT</u> be able to retake it during tutorial.

Midterm and Final exam: These exams will be in essay format.

NOTE: EXAM NUMBERS SHOULD BE USED ON THE ABOVE GRADED ITEMS. **DO NOT USE** PERSONAL NAMES OR SOCIAL SECURITY #s.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Accommodations/Excused from Graded Quizzes or Tests, etc.

Researchers, Pam Mueller and Daniel Oppenheimer, demonstrated that students who write out their notes on paper actually learn more. Even though students who used laptops took **more**

notes, studies have shown that those who wrote out their notes by hand had a stronger conceptual understanding and were more successful in applying and integrating the material than those who used took notes with their laptops.

Campus Carry Policy

As you know, the State of Texas has recently passed legislation permitting you to carry a *concealed* firearm on campus if you have a concealed license permit recognized by the State of Texas, subject to the rules and regulations of Texas Southern University's ("TSU's) Campus Carry Policy.

Under TSU's Campus Carry Policy, *I have the right to designate my office as a gun-free zone*. *I have elected to make my office a firearm-free space*.

PURSUANT TO SECTION 30.06, PENAL CODE (TRESPASS BY LICENSE HOLDER WITH A CONCEALED HANDGUN), A PERSON LICENSED UNDER SUBCHAPTER H, CHAPTER 411, GOVERNMENT CODE (HANDGUN LICENSING LAW), MAY NOT ENTER THIS PROPERTY WITH A CONCEALED HANDGUN. (CONFORME A LA SECCIÒN 30.06 DEL CÒDIGO PENAL (TRASPASAR PORTANDO ARMAS DE FUEGO CON LICENCIA), PERSONAS CON LICENCIA BAJO DEL SUB-CAPITULO 411, CÒDIGO DEL GOBIERNO (LEY DE PORTAR ARMAS), NO DEBEN ENTRAR A ESTA PROPIEDAD PORTANDO UN ARMA DE FUEGO OCULTADA.).
