COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVE

DESCRIPTION:

This course is a 4-credit course covering Sales and Secured Transactions. We will address the principles and practices of the Uniform Commercial Code focusing on Articles 2 and 9 that are those areas primarily covered on the Texas Uniform Bar Exam. UCC Article 2 will focus on the four areas that substantially differ from common law contracts such as UCC §2-207 ("Battle of the Forms" provision); UCC §2-205 (the "Merchants Firm Offer" provision); UCC §2-209 (the "Good Faith Modification" provision) and UCC §2-601 (the "Perfect Tender Rule"). Likewise, this portion of the course will also cover Warranties and other areas of Article 2 that are generally tested on the Uniform Bar Exam. The Course Methodology is designed to address the Learning Outcomes stated below using the Evaluation Tools outlined.

OBJECTIVE:

The goal for this course is to teach students to read and comprehend relevant statutory language found in UCC Articles 2 and 9 (including the code provisions and the corresponding explanatory materials (Official Comments). Additionally, students will successfully reflect their understanding of the language by, first, identifying relevant legal issues raised in the Uniform Bar Exam-type fact scenarios and, second, providing comprehensive analysis of those issues.

Extra Credit POP Quizzes and RETAKES:

20 minutes short essay questions

Students will be given several opportunities to practice short essay written analysis that demonstrates their understanding of commercial law concepts. Extra credit points will be awarded based on completion of the following protocol.

Students will take 5 POP quizzes during class time. The goal for the POP essay quizzes is to give students even more practice writing and analyzing one or two issues through application of *facts* and black letter law concepts from relevant code sections.

Students will receive up to 2 points on each quiz only after fulfilling the following requirements:

Complete the *first* draft of the pop quiz when administered in class for a participation 1. grade equal up to 1 point maximum. Completion of this first draft must represent a good *faith effort* (to be determined solely within the professor's discretion) in application of relevant black letter law to the facts.

2. Meet during your *assigned quiz viewing time* for review of your first draft.

Complete the *retake* of the quiz for possibly earning up to 1 additional point making a 3. **good faith effort to improve** on your application of relevant black letter law to the facts based on the comments provided.

Students will **RETAKE** the *second* draft in-class pop quizzes during tutorial class time. The goal for the **RETAKE** opportunity is to give students yet another exercise in writing and analyzing one or two issues after they have received written comments.

Students *must* participate in "quiz viewings" before becoming eligibile, upon **RETAKING** during tutorial, to earn an additional 1 point.

**Any pop quiz points earned by the student will be added to your total score at the end of the semester. POP QUIZ POINTS ARE AWARDED ONLY IF ALL OF THE 3 REQUIREMENTS LISTED ABOVE ARE MET.

Policy for MISSED In-Class POP QUIZZES: THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UP POP QUIZZES if you fail to attend class on a "pop quiz" day when the 1st draft is administered. If you miss an inclass quiz, you will NOT be able to retake it during tutorial.

Midterm and Final exam: These exams will be in essay format.

Researchers, Pam Mueller and Daniel Oppenheimer, demonstrated that students who write out their notes on paper actually learn more. Even though students who used laptops took **more**

notes, studies have shown that those who wrote out their notes by hand had a stronger conceptual understanding and were more successful in applying and integrating the material than those who used took notes with their laptops.

Students will have ample opportunity to test their understanding of the Code rules of law through specially- constructed Problems in the Whaley textbook that will be addressed in every class.

Students will be called upon randomly throughout the semester and must be prepared to present assigned problems every class period.

Campus Carry Policy

As you know, the State of Texas has recently passed legislation permitting you to carry a *concealed* firearm on campus if you have a concealed license permit recognized by the State of Texas, subject to the rules and regulations of Texas Southern University's ("TSU's) Campus Carry Policy.

(CONFORME A LA SECCIÒN 30.06 DEL CÒDIGO PENAL (TRASPASAR PORTANDO ARMAS DE FUEGO CON LICENCIA), PERSONAS CON LICENCIA BAJO DEL SUB-CAPITULO 411, CÒDIGO DEL GOBIERNO (LEY DE PORTAR ARMAS), NO DEBEN ENTRAR A ESTA PROPIEDAD PORTANDO UN ARMA DE FUEGO OCULTADA.).
