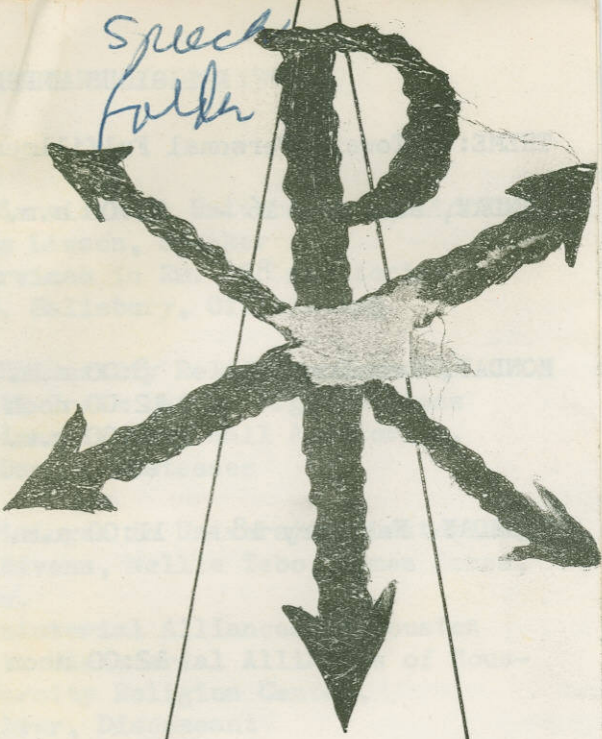
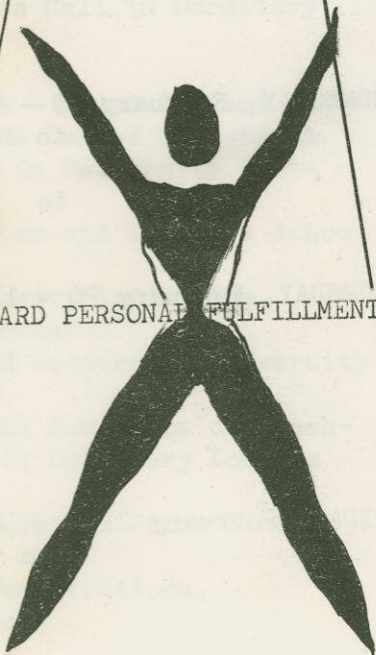

Dr. Daniel W. Fullmer: Dr. Fullmer is Professor of Psychology and Director of the Development and Evaluation Office at Oregon State System of Higher Education, Portland Oregon. He was recipient of the Nancy C. Wimmer Award for 1962-63. This award is given by the American Personnel and Guidance Association for the most outstanding service rendered in this field. He is foremost in conducting counseling workshops for minority groups.

Dr. L. L. Haynes: Dr. Haynes is Pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, Houston, Texas. He was formerly Dean of Students at Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas; also Claflin College, Orangeburg, South Carolina, and President of Morristown Junior College, Morristown, Tennessee. ## GOALS

What are the hoped-for effects of this Week in the life of our University? What does it mean to "emphasize" religion? Why should it be done in the University when our Churches do it continuously?

Out of this planned, common look at Religion, those who have shaped and will lead this activity in Texas Southern University would hope that these things might happen ---

That we think about the purpose of life in this world: what it means to be a man; why our search for truth here is important; what is my real faith that what I do is worth doing.

That we break down the barriers which confine "religion" to church and Sunday, recognizing that God is here in the University, too, where so much of our time and energy is spent.

That we find a mature place for religion in our everyday affairs. Someone has wisely said, "We use arithmetic; we are religious." How mature (religious) are you at the card table, on a date, in the classroom? Is God simply your glorified "rabbit's food"? Do you use the University and the people in it as a "good thing"-- or do you share life here?

What are our goals? Perhaps they are not as important as the quest. You name them. You will, you know. They come out in your life and our common life in Texas Southern University.
